St. John's Church, Llandenny

We were blessed in June with such great summer weather for two gatherings. We planned a Plant swop and Tea and had a wonderful response as it was in aid of our Ugandan Link, Canon Rev'd Gideon Byamugisha. Everyone was pleased to have a good catch up and discover new plants for their garden.

Here is the story of our link. Rev'd Gideon came to Cardiff in

1990 to study at St Michael's College and through one of our congregations several of us met Gideon at our house group in Llandenny parish and as a CMS link he was actively involved in the fight against HIV/AIDS. As a direct result of the meeting members decided we would support him in his work in Uganda in particular to help him pay for his daughter's education.

Gideon had been the first priest in Africa to admit publicly that he was HIV positive and was taking a leading role in organising courses and training events in Uganda in controlling the spread of AIDS.

In 2001 Gideon had initiated in Wakiso district of Kampala, the building of a small community room where people suffering from AIDS could meet and support each other and in 2002 this had grown to include a chapel.

On visiting Llandenny early in 2002 Gideon appealed for ' something Welsh' to decorate Llandenny Quiet Garden House. Parishioners responded immediately and created a wall hanging depicting life in Llandenny. Amazingly Archbishop Rowan Williams was willing to take it and present it to Rev'd Gideon when visiting Uganda in April It had been a busy time for Rev'd Gideon as in November 2001, he was awarded the World Vision International Award for Outstanding Christian Service and in December 2001 he was installed as a Canon in St. Paul's Cathedral, Kampala. The community project has exceeded all expectations. In 2003 other community projects were developed, catering training, developing sponsorship for training orphans and vulnerable children, empowering young people impacted by HIV/AIDS, mobilizing and enlisting volunteers to serve in the centre's training and offering technical advice.

Over the years an Institute has been developed and now National Exams are taken in vocational subjects.

Llandenny continues to support our dear friend Canon Rev. Gideon and his wife Pamela at the Friends of Gideon Foundation, which has evolved and we have supported for 35 years.

On the same weekend we were pleased to welcome St Cybi Consort to lead us in Choral Evensong and after a beautiful service we stood outside in the sunshine with a glass and refreshments enjoying the company of friends and neighbours.
